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

Another thing I have seen and heard during the past year is that Headquarters doesn't know a Post may be in trouble until a phone call is received, then it usually means that Headquarters needs to get involved to help get the Post back on track. When a problem arises, it is usually a financial problem. The Post may owe Federal or State back taxes or cannot pay their monthly bills. This doesn't happen overnight. Posts need to pay attention by reviewing their monthly finance reports from the PFO. They should be able to see talk about anything related to Finance and financial problems before they arise and start asking the leadership questions to get membership. 

The next thing that we started was to slowly assist all our posts to open up. It has been a slow process with some, while others have opened up to what we can call a normal operations for these times. If you have a post meeting and distance yourself from each other and wear mask if necessary, it can do wonders for everyone to get back to some type of order in our post and community but most of all in our life. The department officers have started to travel and visit many posts in the last few months and the reports coming back to headquarters are so encouraging. Some of the posts have completely remodeled and updated their post homes. Many have gone to Efficiency Maine and completely updated their lighting systems to LED and had a majority of the cost paid by the state program. Eligibility Requirements

embership in The American Legion Auxiliary shall be limited to the:

(1) grandmothers, mothers, sisters, spouses, and direct and adopted female descendants of members of The American Legion; and

(2) grandmothers, mothers, sisters, spouses, and direct and adopted female descendants of all men and women who served in either of the following periods: April 6, 1917, to November 11, 1918 and any time after December 7, 1941 who, being a citizen of the United States at the time of their entry therein served on active duty in the Armed Forces of any of the governments associated with the United States during either eligibility periods and died in the line of duty or after honorable discharge;

(3) grandmothers, mothers, sisters, spouses, and direct and adopted female descendants of all men and women who were in the Armed Forces of the United States during either of the following periods: April

6, 1917, to November 11, 1918; and any time after December 7, 1941 who served on active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States during either eligibility periods and died in the line of duty or after honorable discharge; and

(4) to those women who of their own right are eligible for membership in The American Legion.*

A woman who is eligible for American Legion membership is eligible to join the American Legion Auxiliary regardless of whether or not she is a member of The American Legion. However, eligibility of her female relatives (sister, mother, direct descendants) and/or spouse depends upon her membership in The American Legion.

As some of you are aware, the just leave your name, VA stopped all Compensation and Pension exams, which has caused a nice little backlog of around 400,000 claims. When the VA decides to do something, they go big. They are just now starting the exams back up. If you have a claim pending, patience is the word. There is not much new to discuss. Hopefully by the next issue, I can talk about the office opening again.

The Board of Veterans appeals (BVA) is trying to hear cases anyway it can. There has been a stop on all hearing due to the regional office being closed. They had a set of virtual hearings July 22nd and July 23rd. If you know of a veteran that has been contacted about a virtual hearing, there are a few things that the veteran needs to know. The first is they do not have to have a virtual hearing. They can wait for the video hearing that we originally requested. The second is that this office is not notified of the agreed virtual hearing. The BVA is contacting our veterans and scheduling the hearings. I had to cancel two virtual hearings yesterday because the veteran and surviving spouse had no idea what was going on. They were called and told that they had a hearing a week later. That is not how this office does business. If a veteran is contacted, please have them call our office so we can fix the problem.

I hope to be able to see you in my office soon. As always be safe and on the lookout for veterans in need.

We were equipped with electronic receivers which picked up SAM guidance radar signals, which displayed the radar signals on a small circular scope in the center of the console at eye level in front of our seat. When we picked up the SAM tracking radar signal, we pointed the aircraft toward the missile radar signal and prepared to Shrike toward the missile site. Problem was our Shrike had a range of about 10-12 miles, AGL! while the SAM had a range of 20 miles, which seemed hardly fair! Our radar receiver had a special auxiliary receiver tuned to the frequency of the SAM missile guidance signal, so when a missile was launched our receiver had a red light, called the launch light, which emitted an audio signal akin to a police car's radar signal in an automobile. When the launch light, known as the "OS LIGHT", or "Oh Shucks" light, the pilot would turn toward the oncoming missile, placing the nose of our aircraft about 20-30 degrees to the left or right side of our aircraft nose (in order to give us a better estimate of the missile's range than to place the missile straight ahead.)
